# Argentine History: From pre-colonial times through the 20<sup>th</sup> century

**Course load: 64 hours**

## Course Description

This course aims to delve into the economic, cultural, social, and political history of Argentina, since the pre-colonial period through the last decades of the twentieth century. The course will provide an overview of the major processes that marked the historical development of this country, examining at the same time the strong bonds with the other Latin American nations and the complex relations with the major hegemonic powers.

In the first place, we will study the societies of the native peoples of Argentina and the sufferings they experienced due to the Spanish colonization. Next, we will analyze the economic, social, political, and cultural situation of the Viceroyalty of Río de la Plata under Spanish rule and its crisis in the XIX century. Subsequently, we will study the Argentine independence movement, examining its ties with the rest of the Spanish American Revolutions. In fourth place, we will study the postcolonial era and the civil wars between Buenos Aires' elite and the provinces, taking in account the experiences of the Rosistas and Urquistas Confederations. Next, we will examine the liberal conservative order, the state building process, the immigration process, and the emergence of the labor movement and the radical party. Afterwards, we will analyze the crisis of the conservative order, the radical governments, and the brief liberal conservative restoration. Following, we will examine the Peronist governments, and the post Peronist crisis studying the social and political turmoil that agitated Argentina during the 50's, 60's 70's. Finally, we will examine the dictatorships of 1976-1983, the Malvinas War, the democratic restoration, and the neoliberal hegemony in the last decade of the XX century.

In conclusion, the course will refer to the main historical processes and to the most important historiographical currents, focusing on debates and controversies between them, and trying to show the various ways of understanding and addressing the complex history of Argentina.

## Objectives

The course objectives are:



- a) Expose students to the major trends of Argentine history.
- b) Enable students to understand the relationships between Argentina and Latin America and the major international powers during the XVIII, XIX and XX centuries.
- c) Expose students to the main currents of Argentine historiography.

## **Historia Argentina: Desde los tiempos pre-coloniales hasta el siglo XX**

### **Descripción del curso**

Este curso tiene como objetivo abordar la historia económica, cultural, social y política de la Argentina, desde el período pre-colonial hasta las últimas décadas del siglo XX. El curso proporcionará una visión general de los procesos que marcaron el desarrollo histórico de este país, examinando al mismo tiempo, los fuertes lazos con los otros países de América Latina y las complejas relaciones con las grandes potencias hegemónicas.

En primer lugar, estudiaremos las sociedades de los pueblos originarios de la actual Argentina, y los padecimientos que sufrieron debido a la colonización española. A continuación, analizaremos la situación económica, social, política y cultural del Virreinato del Río de la Plata bajo el dominio español y su crisis en el siglo XIX. Posteriormente, abordaremos el movimiento de la independencia argentina, examinando sus relaciones con el resto de las revoluciones hispanoamericanas. En cuarto lugar, analizaremos la era post-colonial y las guerras civiles entre, federales y unitarios marcados por las tensiones entre la élite de Buenos Aires y las provincias, teniendo en cuenta las experiencias de las Confederaciones Rosista y Urquicista. A continuación, estudiaremos el orden liberal conservador, el proceso de construcción del Estado-Nación, el proceso de inmigración, y la aparición del movimiento obrero y la Unión Cívica Radical. Seguidamente, veremos la crisis del orden liberal-conservador, los gobiernos radicales y la década infame. Luego, examinaremos los gobiernos peronistas y la crisis post peronista, centrándonos en los agitados conflictos de los años 60° y 70°. Por último, analizaremos la dictadura de 1976 a 1983, la Guerra Malvinas, la restauración democrática, y la hegemonía neoliberal en la última década del siglo XX.

En conclusión, el curso se referirá a los procesos históricos más relevantes y a las principales corrientes historiográficas, centrándose en los



debates y controversias entre aquellas, tratando de mostrar las distintas formas de entender la compleja historia de Argentina.

## Objectivos

Los objetivos del curso son

- a) Exponer a los estudiantes los principales procesos de la historia argentina.
- b) Ayudar a los estudiantes a comprender las relaciones entre Argentina y América Latina.
- c) Ayudar a los estudiantes a comprender las relaciones internacionales entre Argentina, América Latina y las principales potencias nor-atlánticas durante los siglos XVIII, XIX y XX.
- d) Exponer a los estudiantes a las principales corrientes de la historiografía argentina.
